Abstract: My dissertation offers a novel interpretation of Rousseau’s general will and traces

the development of this from Rousseau to Kant and Hegel. On my reconstruction, Kant aimed to improve on Rousseau's account by replacing his idea of direct participation in legislation with a noumenal idea of reason, and Hegel aimed to improve Kant's account by replacing the noumenal with an empirical idea of reason.
